WHERE ARE MY RECYCLABLES GOING?

The City contracts with Manitowoc Disposal for curbside pickup of residential garbage and recyclables. All garbage goes to the landfill, while recyclables are recycled, per Wisconsin State law.

Some residents have questioned why they see their recyclables being tossed into the back of a rear-load garbage truck. Are those materials truly being diverted out of the waste stream, kept out of the landfill?

Yes, those materials you see going into a "garbage truck" are indeed being recycled.

On each collection day, that truck first covers the collection route to pick up paper and corrugated waste, which goes to the Manitowoc County Material Recovery Facility (MRF). The surge in home deliveries from Amazon and other on-line marketers in recent years has caused a huge increase in the volume of corrugated cardboard being picked up and recycled—that makes the packer truck is a real necessity.


The same rear-load packer then makes a second round to collect other recyclables: clear and colored glass, #1 and #2 plastic, aluminum, tin and steel cans, and certain cartons. Those all go into the truck together— "co-mingled." Then, at Manitowoc Disposal they are loaded into large containers that get shipped to a facility in Outagamie County that sorts and processes co-mingled recyclables.

The process described above is much more efficient than sorting all recyclables into separate bins on a collection truck at curbside, helping keep the cost of collection down.

Front Yard Vegetable Garden - Pilot Program Still Available

The City's Zoning Ordinance generally prohibits vegetable gardens in front yards.



For 2023, the City Council has authorized a pilot program to allow growing vegetables in front yards, using raised beds and/or containers.

This pilot program is being promoted by the City's Environmental Advisory Board, to demonstrate that front yard vegetable gardening can be both attractive and productive.

The deadline for applying for this program has been extended to July 1, 2023, and the permit fee has been waived.
